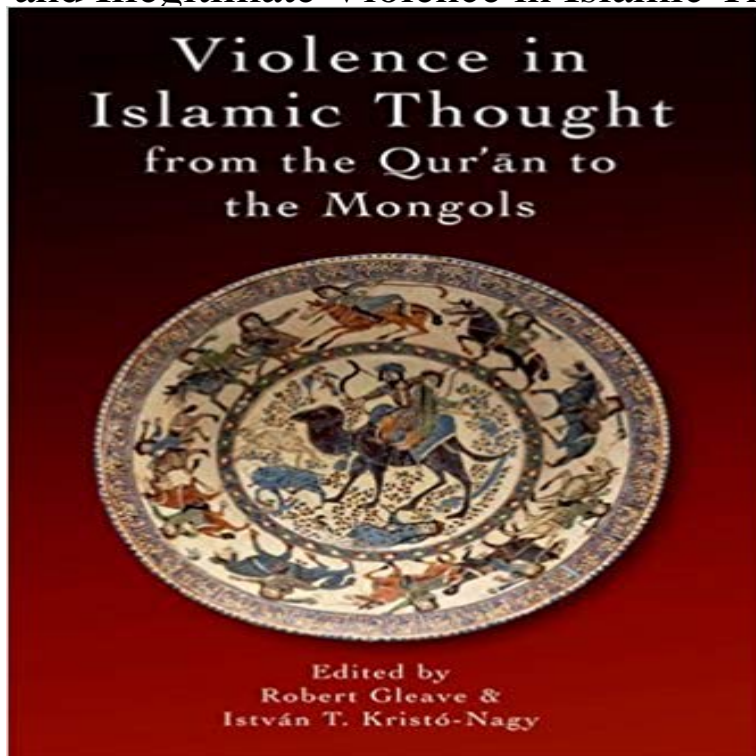


# Violence in Islamic Thought from the Quran to the Mongols (Legitimate and Illegitimate Violence in Islamic Thought)
